Mike Ley showed 2 covers from Finland—one from June 1939 with a special cancel advertising the 1940 Helsinki Olympics (not held due to WWII) and a second from December 1939 censored due the start of WWII in September 1939.

Willy Knopp showed a small box mailed with a 17c prexie (Sc.822) paying the 2 pound rate at the time.

Tom Johnson showed a June 1942 Angola cover mailed from the S.S. West Kebar. The ship was torpedoed and sunk in October, 1942,

Roy Whitington showed a piece with a Malta stamp postmarked May 7, 1942 to mark the arrival of a new governor "during the supreme hour of trial in defying and defeating the Axis Powers." **Roy** also showed a collection of tiny stamps from Mecklein(?) Schwerin.

Bob Akaki showed a New Zealand 1c stamp overprinted "King Edward VII Land" to support Ernest Shackleton's 1914 failed expedition to cross Antarctica on foot.

Mark Sellhorn showed a small collection of antique Christmas postcards.

The meeting was followed by enthusiastic buying/selling/trading among members.

- LINPEX 2025 is a noncompetitive show open to members of Lincoln Stamp Club and show dealers. All entries must have a philatelic connection and be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.
- 2. An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit, provided a separate entry form is submitted for each entry. Photocopies of the entry form are acceptable. The maximum number of frames per exhibit is four (4).
- 3. Each frame will hold sixteen (16) 8 1/2" X 11" pages without overlap. Each page should be inserted into a transparent sheet protector. Each page must be progressively numbered on the back.
- 4. The entry fee is \$5.00 per frame.
- 5. Entry forms and fee must be mailed to the exhibits coordinator (see entry form). Entry form must be received by Jan. 31 2025. Exhibitors will be informed of acceptance of their entries and will receive a full refund for any rejected exhibit.



Any exhibitor who does not pick up his or her exhibit in person (of have his or her agent do so) must include prepayment for the return of the entry and provide instructions for return on the entry form. British Examiner 5081 Clears Wartime Letter to Yale

During World War II, governments on both sides commonly practiced censorship of outbound mail. Censors opened letters, reviewed their contents, and resealed envelopes with various sealing tapes. This letter, sent near the end of 1940 from London to New Haven, is sealed on its left edge with tape applied by Examiner 5081. The envelope no longer contains the letter, so the exact nature of the communications remains unknown.

The envelope does contain some other details, however, that help to narrow the range of topics. The back flap, pictured in the reduced lower image, indicates the sender was



London to New Haven, Connecticut: A single 2 1/2 d King George VI definitive stamp from the 1940 series paid the international surface letter rate for the first weight unit. This rate remained in use from 1 May 1940 through July 1949. The stamp, issued in June 1940, exists with two watermark orientations. The variant here cannot be identified without removing it.

The front of the envelope presents the recipient's hand written address as

Sears Foundation for Marine Research Yale University

New Haven Conn. U.S.A.

So, what might be the connection between a book seller and a foundation dedicated to marine research? A bit of Web searching reveals that the bookseller was a longtime publisher of such works as The Journal of Conchology, which the Conchological Society of Great Britain and Ireland first released in 1874. Conchology is the study of mollusk shells.

The Sears Foundation's roots lie in the work of Albert E. Parr, the director of the Bingham Oceanographic Laboratory at Yake University, to use a gift from Henry

Sears to establish the Sears Foundation for Marine Research.

Henry Sears, in turn, served as a researcher on the *Atlantis*, which the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, Woods Hole, Massachusetts, sent out to conduct studies of Maine's coastal waters. During these studies, Sears discovered several previously undocumented species of fish: *Searsia polycoeca* and *Searsia koefoedi*.

Sears inherited money from a well-to-do uncle and gave \$85,000 (\$1.455 million in 2018 dollars) to Yale University in 1937 to fund the foundation.

That's about as far as some diligent Bing or Google searches can take the connection. Both the sender and the recipient have documented interests in marine studies. One might guess that the censors found nothing in the correspondence that would have compromised the war effort in 1940.
